Defensemen

4 - Domenic Della Civita

Domenic Della Civita is a mobile, puck-moving defenseman who has quickly become an important part of the Pee Dee IceCats' blue line. A native of Ontario, Della Civita brings a blend of skating ability, offensive instincts, and competitive edge that fits perfectly with the IceCats' transition-driven style. He's the type of defenseman who can jumpstart a breakout with one clean pass or carry the puck through the neutral zone to create instant offense.

Since joining the IceCats, Della Civita has shown he can impact the game at both ends of the ice. He defends with good stick positioning and active feet, but what really stands out is his ability to read plays and turn defense into attack. Whether he's walking the blue line to open shooting lanes or joining the rush as a fourth attacker, he brings a dynamic element that forces opponents to respect his presence. Fans appreciate his confidence with the puck, and coaches value how he balances creativity with responsibility.

5 - Jake Jurgeneit

Jake Jurgeneit brings a strong, physical presence to the Pee Dee IceCats blue line, leaning on the maturity and structure he developed during his collegiate career at Trinity Western University. Across four seasons in the CWUAA, he became known as a dependable defender who embraced tough minutes, killed penalties, and played a no-frills, team-first style. His game isn't built around offense—it's built around shutting plays down, winning battles, and making life difficult for opposing forwards.

Since turning pro, Jurgeneit has carried that same identity into the FPHL. With the IceCats, he's carved out a role as a stay-at-home defenseman who thrives in physical situations and isn't shy about using his size to protect the crease. Fans appreciate his willingness to block shots, finish checks, and bring a steadying presence to the defensive corps. He's the kind of player whose impact shows up in the hard minutes rather than the scoresheet.

6 - Xavier Abdella

Xavier Abdella is a steady, defensively disciplined blueliner who brings structure, poise, and a quietly effective presence to the Pee Dee IceCats' back end. A product of the New England hockey scene, Abdella built his game on positioning, awareness, and a commitment to doing the little things right — the subtle details that don't always draw attention but absolutely matter over the course of a game. He's not a flashy defenseman, but he's dependable, and that reliability has made him a trusted piece of the IceCats' defensive rotation. Having played with the Danbury Hat Tricks' championship team in the 2022-23 season, he also brings critical postseason experience to the team.

Since joining Pee Dee, Abdella has embraced the role of a stabilizer. He keeps his game simple, stays tight defensively, and makes the kind of low-risk decisions that help settle down shifts. His reads are clean, his gaps are disciplined, and he rarely gets caught chasing plays. Coaches appreciate his predictability and his ability to execute structure, while fans value the disciplined style he brings to the ice every night.

7 - Timur Rasulov

Timur Rasulov anchors the Pee Dee IceCats' blue line with a blend of defensive reliability and puck-moving instincts. A defenseman who developed his game across European and North American pro circuits, Rasulov is valued for his positioning, gap control, and ability to break up plays before they become dangerous. He reads the game well, uses his stick effectively in the defensive zone, and isn't afraid to finish checks or block shots to protect the net.

Offensively, Rasulov contributes by starting clean breakouts and making smart, timely outlet passes that jumpstart the transition game. He's effective on the penalty kill and in late-game defensive situations, and his steady, two-way play gives coaches confidence when matching up against opponents' top lines. Fans notice his quiet consistency—his impact shows up in controlled defensive minutes and the occasional key point shot or secondary assist.

9 - Charlie Bedard

Charlie Bedard is a steady, stay-at-home defenseman who brings structure, physicality, and a no-nonsense approach to the Pee Dee IceCats' blue line. Coming out of the New England and Mid-Atlantic hockey circuits, Bedard built his game on reliability — the kind of defender who keeps things simple, protects the house, and makes life easier for his partner and goaltender. He isn't flashy, but he's dependable, and that consistency has made him a trusted piece of the IceCats' defensive rotation.

Since joining Pee Dee, Bedard has embraced the role of a stabilizer. He plays a straightforward, hard-edge style: winning battles below the dots, clearing traffic from the crease, and shutting down rushes with strong positioning. His reads are clean, his gaps are disciplined, and he rarely strays from the structure the coaching staff expects. Fans appreciate his toughness and willingness to do the dirty work, while coaches value the predictability he brings to every shift.

21 - Nicholas Magill-Diaz

As the inaugural captain of the Pee Dee IceCats, Nicholas Magill-Diaz sets the tone for everything the team does — on the ice, in the locker room, and throughout the Florence community. A composed, intelligent defenseman by trade, Magill-Diaz leads with a calm, steady presence that anchors the IceCats' identity. He's the player teammates look to during chaotic stretches, the voice that settles the bench, and the example younger players model their habits after.

Magill-Diaz's leadership style blends professionalism with approachability. He's demanding in the right ways — holding himself to the highest standard and expecting the same from those around him — but he's also the first to encourage, teach, or lift up a teammate. His ability to balance accountability with support has made him the natural heartbeat of the IceCats' room. Coaches trust him implicitly, and fans recognize the pride he takes in representing Pee Dee both on and off the ice.

25 - Jordan Popoff

Jordan Popoff is a steady, physical defenseman who joined the Pee Dee IceCats for their inaugural FPHL season. A Calgary native, he's built his career across several minor leagues, including stints with the Columbus River Dragons, Carolina Thunderbirds, and Knoxville Ice Bears. Known for his size (6'2", 200 lbs) and right-handed shot, Popoff plays a rugged, stay-at-home style that emphasizes positioning and toughness. He's not a flashy scorer, but his willingness to block shots, clear the crease, and lean into the physical side of the game makes him a valuable presence on the blue line.

Popoff's journey through the FPHL and SPHL shows a player who has carved out a role as a reliable depth defenseman. With Columbus and Carolina, he chipped in offensively with a handful of assists, but his bread-and-butter remains defensive responsibility. Fans in Florence have quickly recognized his grit—he's not afraid to rack up penalty minutes if it means standing up for teammates or disrupting opponents in front of the net. While his stat line may not jump off the page, his contributions are felt in the tough, grinding minutes that don't always make the highlight reel.

Forwards

8 - Denis Zaichyk

Denis Zaichyk (Dzianis) is a left-shot forward from Gomel, Belarus, who has built a varied professional résumé across Europe and North America. He's shown the ability to score and create at the pro level, combining a physical frame with a willingness to drive to the net and battle in traffic.

Zaichyk's most productive recent season came in the FPHL with the Hudson Valley Venom, where he posted 33 points in 32 games, demonstrating both finishing ability and playmaking instincts.

On the IceCats, Zaichyk offers a blend of secondary scoring and experienced pro savvy. He's comfortable on the power play and in transition, and his prior experience in Belarusian pro leagues and multiple FPHL stops gives him a toolkit that translates well to Florence's style of play. Coaches value his ability to find soft ice in the offensive zone and to contribute in puck-possession sequences; fans notice his willingness to mix skill with physicality.

10 - Matthew Gilbert

Matthew Gilbert is a hardworking, north-south forward who brings grit, pace, and a reliable compete level to the Pee Dee IceCats' lineup. Coming out of the Midwestern junior circuit, Gilbert built his game on effort and physical engagement — the kind of player who earns every inch of ice and forces opponents into uncomfortable situations. He's not afraid to get to the hard areas, and his willingness to battle below the dots has made him a valuable depth piece in Pee Dee's forward rotation.

Since joining the IceCats, Gilbert has carved out a role as a forechecking presence who can tilt momentum with his energy. He thrives on pressure, chasing down loose pucks, finishing checks, and creating second-chance opportunities for his linemates. His shot has some pop when he gets inside positioning, and he's shown he can chip in offense through sheer persistence.

11 - Dominiks Marcinkevics

Dominiks Marcinkevics has emerged as one of the Pee Dee IceCats' most dynamic offensive threats, blending European finesse with the gritty, north-south pace of the FPHL. A native of Latvia, Marcinkevics moved directly into the North American pro game and quickly showed he could create offense against any matchup. His game is built on quick hands, sharp edges, and the ability to turn small pockets of space into high-danger scoring chances.

Since arriving in Florence, Marcinkevics has delivered in big moments — late-game goals, momentum-swinging assists, and the kind of shift-to-shift creativity that forces defenders to stay honest. He thrives in tight areas, attacks defenders one-on-one, and has a knack for making plays out of broken sequences. Fans have embraced his flair and competitiveness, and coaches value how he elevates the pace whenever he hops over the boards.

12 - TJ Prexler

TJ Prexler is a high-motor, all-situations forward who brings pace, competitiveness, and a reliably disruptive presence to the Pee Dee IceCats' lineup. Raised in the Midwest hockey circuit, Prexler developed a reputation as a player who thrives on effort — someone who wins races, pressures defenders into mistakes, and forces the game to be played at his tempo. He's the kind of forward who can tilt momentum simply by being relentless, and that edge has made him a valuable piece of Pee Dee's forward group.

Since joining the IceCats, Prexler has shown he can impact the game in multiple ways. He forechecks with purpose, battles hard in the trenches, and has enough touch to turn loose pucks into scoring chances. His shot is quick off the rush, and he's proven he can finish when he gets inside positioning. Coaches appreciate his consistency and his ability to elevate the pace of a shift, while fans gravitate toward the energy he brings every time he hops over the boards.

13 - Alexander Legkov

Since joining the IceCats, Apollon has embraced the role of a momentum-shifter. A new arrival to the FPHL, he forechecks with force, finishes every hit, and wins the kind of board battles that wear down opponents over the course of a night. While his offensive game is still developing, he's shown flashes of scoring touch, especially when he drives the net or finds space off the cycle. Coaches value his toughness and willingness to do the hard jobs, and fans gravitate toward his fearless, blue-collar style.

16 - Trevor Lord

Trevor Lord is a hard-working, defensively responsible forward who has become one of the Pee Dee IceCats' most reliable depth contributors in their inaugural FPHL season. A native of Ontario, Lord brings a mature, detail-oriented approach to the ice — the kind of player who wins board battles, kills penalties, and handles the gritty minutes that stabilize a lineup. But he's far more than just a grinder. Lord has shown a knack for timely scoring, using smart positioning and a quick, deceptive release to chip in offense exactly when the IceCats need it most.

Since joining Pee Dee, Lord has carved out a role as a steady, physical presence who can also finish plays. He thrives in the cycle, finds soft spots in coverage, and has a habit of turning hard-earned puck battles into scoring chances. Coaches appreciate how he blends structure with opportunistic offense, and fans notice the way he elevates his game in key moments — a player who earns respect through effort, reliability, and the ability to bury chances when they matter.

17 - Houston Wilson

Houston Wilson has quickly become one of the Pee Dee IceCats' most reliable playmakers, boasting a PPGA consistently north of 1.0. A Philadelphia native, Wilson's career has taken him through the UCHC (Stevenson University), SPHL, and FPHL, where he's consistently shown a knack for creating offense and setting up teammates. His style blends speed and vision—he's not just a finisher but a facilitator, often sparking scoring chances with crisp passes and smart positioning. Fans in Florence have embraced his ability to drive the attack while keeping penalties low, making him a steady presence on the IceCats' top lines.

Wilson's journey across multiple leagues highlights his adaptability and growth as a forward. Whether in Delaware, Elmira, Pensacola, or Monroe, he's proven he can contribute offensively while maintaining discipline. Now with the IceCats, he's become a cornerstone of their offense, balancing scoring with playmaking and earning a reputation as one of the team's most dependable forwards.

18 - Vadim Frolov

Vadim Frolov is a skilled, offensively minded forward who brings a blend of finesse, patience, and creativity to the Pee Dee IceCats' attack. Developed through the Russian junior and minor-pro system, Frolov arrived in Pee Dee with a reputation for being a cerebral player — someone who sees the ice a step ahead and can slow the game down when everyone else is scrambling. His puck control and vision make him a natural playmaker, and when he's confident, he can dictate the pace of an entire shift.

Since joining the IceCats, Frolov has carved out a role as a possession driver who thrives when the puck is on his stick. He's at his best when he's working give-and-go plays, manipulating defenders with subtle fakes, and creating seams that weren't there a moment earlier. While he's not the most physical forward in the lineup, his ability to read pressure and make smart, efficient plays has made him a valuable piece of Pee Dee's offensive structure. Fans appreciate his smooth, almost effortless style, and coaches rely on his poise in tight situations.

19 - Nick Gullo

Nick Gullo is a steady, two-way forward who brings structure, effort, and reliability to the Pee Dee IceCats' lineup. Coming out of the Northeast hockey scene, Gullo has built his game around smart positioning, responsible play, and the kind of shift-to-shift consistency coaches lean on. He's not the loudest player on the ice, but he's the one who quietly keeps things moving in the right direction — winning small battles, supporting the puck, and making the simple plays that add up over sixty minutes.

Since joining the IceCats, Gullo has carved out a role as a dependable depth forward who can handle tough assignments without sacrificing pace or competitiveness. He reads the game well, stays above the puck, and brings a workmanlike approach that helps stabilize whatever line he's on. Fans appreciate his honest, blue-collar style, and teammates value how he shows up the same way every night.

26 - Nathan Carl

Nathan Carl is a skilled, pace-driving forward who brings a blend of speed, finesse, and offensive creativity to the Pee Dee IceCats' lineup. Coming out of the Western Canadian junior system, Carl arrived in Pee Dee with a reputation for being a smooth skater who can make plays at full stride. He's the type of forward who can change the feel of a shift with one controlled zone entry or a quick, deceptive release that catches goaltenders off guard.

Since joining the IceCats, Carl has carved out a role as a reliable offensive presence who thrives when the puck is on his stick. He reads the ice well, finds seams that others miss, and has the hands to finish in tight. His ability to create off the rush gives Pee Dee a dynamic element, and when he's confident, he can tilt the ice in the IceCats' favor. Coaches appreciate his hockey IQ and his ability to adapt to different linemates, while fans gravitate toward his smooth, effortless style.

27 - Patriks Marcinkevics

Patriks Marcinkevics has become the heartbeat of the Pee Dee IceCats' offense, leading the team in scoring and driving play every night. Coming out of Latvia's development system, he moved straight into the North American pro game, where his blend of speed, skill, and creativity immediately stood out. Before arriving in Florence, he spent time in the SPHL with the Roanoke Rail Yard Dawgs, showing flashes of the dynamic scorer he would become.

With the IceCats, Patriks has taken his game to another level. He attacks with pace, handles the puck confidently in traffic, and has a knack for finding soft spots in coverage. Whether he's finishing chances himself or setting up teammates with quick, deceptive passes, he's a constant threat in the offensive zone. Fans have embraced his flair and consistency — he's the kind of player who can tilt the ice and change the momentum of a game in a single shift.

Goalies

1 - Sean Kuhn

Sean Kuhn is one of the three goaltenders anchoring the Pee Dee IceCats' crease, bringing a composed, technically disciplined presence to the team's inaugural FPHL season. A native of New York, Kuhn plays a calm, economical style — he stays square to shooters, controls rebounds well, and rarely gets caught scrambling. His game is built on patience and positioning, making him a reliable option whenever the IceCats turn to him between the pipes. It's all too common to hear the crowd shout "Kuuuhhhnnn!" as he defends the net for Pee Dee.

Within the IceCats' three-goalie system, Kuhn has carved out a role defined by reliability and preparation. He's known for his sharp reads off the rush and his ability to stay controlled during extended defensive-zone pressure. Kuhn brings a methodical, detail-driven approach to every start, augmented by his extensive experience in playing FPHL hockey. His focus and consistency make him a trusted option whenever Pee Dee needs a composed performance in goal.

30 - Parker Rutherford

Parker Rutherford is a poised, athletic goaltender who joined the Pee Dee IceCats during their inaugural FPHL season and immediately stepped into a meaningful role within the team's three-man rotation. Coming from previous FPHL experience with the Danville Dashers, Rutherford brought with him a reputation for quick reflexes, strong lateral movement, and the ability to stay composed during high-pressure sequences. His early success with Pee Dee — including a 4-0 shutout of the defending champion Binghamton Black Bears — reflect a goalie capable of making difficult saves look routine.

Rutherford's style blends technical structure with instinctive athleticism. He tracks the puck well through traffic, controls rebounds effectively, and has shown the ability to settle the team down during chaotic stretches. Coaches value his calm presence and his willingness to battle through second-chance opportunities, while fans appreciate the confidence he brings to the crease. As the IceCats continue to build their identity, Rutherford has emerged as a stabilizing force and a key part of the team's long-term plans in net.

35 - Matt Sayles

Matt Sayles is a calm, technically sound goaltender from Milton, Georgia, and one of the three netminders anchoring the Pee Dee IceCats' crease in their inaugural FPHL season. Having played college hockey at Nazareth College in Rochester, NY, he arrived in Florence as a relatively under-the-radar signing. However, he quickly proved he belonged at the pro level with his poised, positionally disciplined style. Sayles isn't the type to rely on flashy desperation saves — he plays a controlled, efficient game built on angles, rebound management, and reading shooters before they release the puck.

Within the IceCats' three-goalie rotation, Sayles has carved out a reputation as the steady one: the goalie who keeps the team in games even when the shot count tilts heavily the other way. His ability to stay composed during extended defensive-zone pressure has earned the trust of both the coaching staff and his teammates. Fans have come to appreciate his consistency, his work ethic, and the quiet confidence he brings to the crease every night he gets the nod.
